Out of this impressive tick list, six of Thomasina's sends were first female ascents (FFA). Most notable may be her 3rd ascent (first female) of the Hueco V11, *The Hand*, which was dispatched second go, "It was fun but scary," recalled Thomasina. Among the other FFA's, *Sunshine* was done in one session and *Le Chinkle* was pieced together in just a few. "*Chinkle* was my favorite out of all of the FFAs--I really love roof climbing" Thomo says, and *Une Pointe de Bleau dans un Hueco*, another FFA, "felt like the most desperate send. I felt like I was going to fall on every move. I feel like I could repeat most of the problems except this one!"

The most personally satisfying of sends came when Thomasina settled a score she had with *Chblanke*, "I ruined a finger on it a long time ago and the crux never clicked for me." Determination and strength combined with some "sneaky beta" made it all click, "then finally the position made sense, I was so psyched to have done *Chblanke*."

Traveling with her daughter Cedar (3), Thomasina splits her time between the rocks, libraries, museums, and thrift stores, creating many interesting and educational ways to spend their time and keeping them both entertained. Still in Joe's Valley, Thomasina's tick list continues to expand. She is hoping to hit up one more spot on the way home—Leavenworth, WA—where the sending will persist.
